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#### Power to the People

*Power to the People* brings together two Arts + Culture graduating classes in the production of an innovative multi-disciplinary exhibition and poster campaign celebrating the power of individual and collective action to advance social and political change.

*Power to the People* emerged as the theme for this year's Arts and Culture Gala through discussions with students about the role that the arts play in political life, and about the social and cultural politics in view in the first decades of the 21st century, especially since January 2017.

Casting a wide net, our conversations considered the political situation of Indigenous Peoples in Canada, the rise of xenophobia here and around the world, the plight of refugees, racism, sexism, climate change and environmental catastrophe, and, of course, the election of Donald Trump. And, in the face of such adversity, we also observed the rise in grass roots political organizations and a renewed belief in personal and collective agency to bring about change.

The project was conceived under the rubric of an Integrating Activity project, as a means to demonstrate the skills and competencies that students have acquired in their studies in the Arts and Culture Profile. In the end it says something more profound about the social consciousness of this generation. *Power to the People* represents hope, a clear commitment to collective action, to social justice and to political change.

The realization of this project is indebted to the hard work and commitment of a number of people. 
#### Connecting Culture Through Pin + Thread






# Hear What I Am Saying Elyssia Castellan

# It's All Noise - A Milk Boy's Production

The goal of our project is to create an immersive space designed to induce in the viewer political, personal, and social reflections. This collaboration was inspired by the geopolitical climate as presented by Western news outlets since the recent US election. More specifically, we want to focus a perceived increase in international militarization, political trends leaning towards oppressive values, and the social effect of regular media use and consumption.

The installation consists of s closed space containing original artwork, speakers playing a recording of the Milk Boys track "It's All Noise" and an accompanying video. Our project aims to tackle the dichotomy of fear and hope that we see prevalent in our society. We seek to accomplish this by responding to a feeling of helplessness with a powerful message of strength and persistence, through an original song and video.

This project will additionally address the role of the artist in a changing world. We seek to emphasize the link between art and radical awareness. We believe that this connection can lead to widespread activism.

Ultimately, our installation aims to provoke and unsettle. If you are feeling uncomfortable, you should be.


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#### Mirror, Mirror Jake Shtern + Ava Catellier

Do we really know who we are when we see our reflections in the mirror or are we just products of the past that will determine the outcomes of our future? *Mirror*, *Mirror* by Jake Shtern and Ava Catellier will explore this question thoroughly through a set-up of three mirrors, three headsets and IPods, pens and sticky notes, and big curtains that will close off into a triangular shape. This highly interactive installation will put the participants in place to decide their identity through step by step recordings they hear as they go to each mirror. The first one will ask questions about their past, the second about the present, and the third about their future. With each subject writing down one answer on a sticky note, all three mirrors will become full of sticky notes until the mirror can't be seen anymore. Finally transforming it into one cohesive piece that will demonstrate the participants' responses, and make us realize that maybe past and future identity really does correlate; all you have to do is press play.



# My Vocabulary Includes Sex

What is identity? And how can one find it in a mainstream society where we are consistently told who we should be? Gaelle Marcil and Megan Winnard will be questioning these themes through snippets of prose pieces, poems, and personal images that will all come together in a zine. Its narrative will talk about the struggle of us constantly having to define who we are based on our gender, the way we dress, our income, and other varying factors that the society deems as "important". 
#### **Photographing Hope**




# POC: Power of Colour Crystal Tsai






# **Producer**Bela Portela Andrade

# Charlotte Giguère



## Victoria Mastrocola




# **Producer: Public Relations**Japhir Charles



# Relayed Revolution A Music Video Compilation Zoe Aikman

Continuing my ongoing interests in film, music and social activism, my Integrating Activity project takes the form of a music video compilation. The video consists of a re-produced version of the Gorillaz' song, "Clint Eastwood", and news clips from different channels that center around select social activism related events. The song is combined with Sampa the Great's "The Revolution will be Televised" and J Dilla's "Walkinonit".

"Clint Eastwood" was chosen for the message conveyed by the lyrics, which focuses on the divergence between the world we are perceiving and the reality to which we must awaken. The song's chorus addresses the dependence one has on hope for the future when people perceive themselves as useless in the present. This idea is meant to manifest itself both in a negative and positive light, forcing the viewers to think about their own personal interpretation of the work.

The contrast between the song's lyrics and its accompanying clips is meant to highlight the key role of the media in current social activism. It particularly underlines the discrepancies between what we are being told and what is really occurring. The power of the media has further created another problem, which I perceive as a "Progress Paradox": the more we consume "news" related to injustices, the more futility arises in taking action to fix it. This is partially due to the media demonizing protesters and ideologies that derive from the bottom-up. The synthesis between the two mediums serves to reveal the contrast between the messages presented in the clips in order to further propagate the theme of my project.

We are inviting women of all ages to express their feelings about the pride they take in being a woman by writing anonymously on the various coloured notepads that we will make available in the exhibition. It can be a quote, a simple word, a phrase, a lyric or anything else. The possibilities are endless. When you have written down your message we welcome you to stick it onto any one of the canvases.
